Pastor's Message

The events that recently took place in Atlanta, the killing of 8 innocent people was heartbreaking. It points to a nationwide crisis, a pandemic of prejudice and racism that has exploded in the wake of Covid-19. Violence against Asian-Americans is on the rise, but racism isn't new. Violence, hatred and bigotry - in word and action against Asian

American and Pacific Islander individuals must end. It must be opposed at all times and at every level.

In truth, verbal assaults and physical attacks against Asian Americans and their businesses being vandalized is not new, but those crimes are not often given the same attention as assaults on other minority groups. Part of what has caused this spike in anti-Asian bias incidents is bigoted and hateful rhetoric that blames China and by association Chinese Americans for the COVID-19 pandemic. Seriously? Are we that naïve? Sadly, an article published by PBS traces a sordid tale throughout U.S. history in regards to our deplorable treatment of Asian Americans over time.

It seems that whenever there are problems in American society, political or economic, there always seems to be the need for a scapegoat -- someone or a group of people who is/are singled out, unjustifiably blamed, and targeted with severe hostility. Combined with the cultural stereotype of Asian Americans as quiet, weak, and powerless, more and more Asian Americans are victimized, solely on the basis of being an Asian American.

In early 2020, reports started circulating about a new infectious respiratory disease that seems to have originated in Wuhan, China. Coronovirus or COVID-19 became a pandemic that has spread around the world. The COVID-19 pandemic has also resulted in widespread racist and xenophobic rhetoric, such as using terms like "Chinese virus," "Wuhan virus," or "Kung-flu", along with mis/disinformation, and conspiracy theories spread through various media outlets. In turn, these have led to suspicion, hostility, hate, and even violence against anyone perceived to be Chinese or more generally, Asian, Pacific Islander and/or Asian American.

What can we do to change the course of history as well as our own behavior and attitudes? Educate yourself and examine your life. Learn about the mistreatment of Asians and Asian Americans in U.S. history. Take a good look at your circle of friends and what you read. Do you have a good way to tap people and ideas that differ from how you identify and what you feel comfortable with? Have you examined stereotypes you hold about people of other races? Jesus calls us to accept all people for who they are.

Then, be an ally and speak out! Not just for Asians who are hurting, but for other groups in pain. This is not a contest about which racial group has it worst. We all should be fighting for a world full of grace. Donate to causes, if you have the means. Or read about organizations that are helping to stop the hate. There are many articles you can find through a simple search for "how to help Asians." We all need to learn how we can be part of the solution rather than part of the problem and how we can be a source of healing and wholeness to all those in need.

Recently I saw a post on Facebook written by a beautiful young Korean born American woman who was raised in this congregation. I was pained to hear her experience. I asked Grace if I could share her experience and reflections with you. I wish I could take away her pain, but what we can do is examine our own hearts and ask ourselves how can we be advocates for all God's children.

Hear Grace's story...

People keep asking me how I'm doing with the rise in Asian targeted hate crimes. I keep saying that I'm okay. I sat on the question the other night and I'm actually not okay. I'm emotional and I'm processing everything. It's sad because a part of me hopes that my future children look more like Adam and less like me for fears of bullying and harassment. Even

just for a moment, that thought has crossed my mind. It's so hard to be proud of yourself when you're fearful.

Reflecting on my life, I can't even tell you the amount of micro aggressions and racial remarks I received growing up, including the ESL teacher who called my mom asking when she was going to sign me up for English lessons.. just because I was Korean by birth. I used to brush it off, even laugh. What else was I supposed to do? Everyone's white and I'm not. I tried so hard to be someone that I wasn't. I will note that at that time, I didn't view it as that and I'm sure the people saying it didn't either. These were my friends. And I hope since then, they've learned.

People asking if I see "wide screen or full screen". People pulling their eyes to make them look slanted (INCLUDING THAT FOX EYE TREND KNOCK IT OFF). I've been fetishized my whole life simply because I'm "exotic"; high school, college, even now probably. Know that I can take a joke, but the events that are going on right now are real. The build up of anger and sadness inside me HURTS. When COVID-19 first hit, I was harassed at the mall while shopping by myself. Two males approached me and started coughing yelling "yo she's got the corona." "She got the kung flu". No one. Not a single fucking person said anything until I turned around and snapped. I remember getting into my car after safely being escorted by the police and just sobbing. I had no idea what just happened.

I am not a gook. I am not a chink. I am not your China virus or kung flu. My name is Grace and I am a very strong Korean American woman. My parents raised me to be resilient and to stand up for others and myself; be a decent human being. Protect myself and others. I want people to read this. I want people to feel what I've been through. I want people to change for the better.

Classes will be held for those in 2nd grade or older who have yet to receive instruction for 1st Holy Communion.




