Pastor's Message

How do you feel about the idea of dying? Is it something you think about often? Or do you prefer to put those thoughts on the back burner. Have you ever shut someone down when they said, "when I die..."? This pandemic has reminded us that death is always close by and is an event we will all face someday. But our reluctance to talk about death is often interpreted as evidence that we are afraid, and therefore suppress thoughts about it. More often than not we seem more bothered by the prospect of losing our loved ones than we do about dying ourselves. Studies also show that we worry more about the dying process – the pain and loneliness involved than about the end of

life itself. In general, when we are asked if we are afraid to die, most of us deny it.

Typically, I have found that individuals who survive accidents, serious illnesses and other close brushes with death look at the world with new eyes. They no longer take life and the people in their lives for granted. Encounters with death can wake us up. They snap us out of a trance-like state in which we are indifferent to life and unaware of the blessings in our lives. And yet I think we

can gain some of that by simply contemplating death. Becoming aware of our own mortality can be a liberating and awakening experience, which can paradoxically, help us to live authentically and fully. It can give us the ability to live in the present, with an appreciation for small and simple things, such as being in nature, looking at the sky and the stars, and spending time with family. It may also give us a broader perspective, so worries that weigh upon us no longer seem important. We become less materialistic and more altruistic and relationships become more genuine and authentic. Life is too short and fleeting to worry about other people or harbor resentment against other people.

Lent offers us an opportunity to contemplate life and death. It is an opportunity to contemplate our mortality. If ever there is a time that the Christian faith dwells on death, practices it, even celebrates it, surely it is Lent. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday with those solemn words of death: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." In the words of the Psalmist, "You turn us back to the dust and say, 'Go back, O child of earth.' " We receive the ashes of Ash Wednesday as a sign of our mortality: a precursor -of our own death and those final words: "Ashes to ashes, dust to dust." As a Christian contemplating death, I realize that it is not something to be feared. I should not fear death because I know that the moment I die I will enter into eternal life with my Savior, Jesus Christ. I receive this gift of eternal life not because of my goodness, but because Christ died for my sins on the cross, paying the price of my sins, and offering a way for me to be reconciled to God. Because of this, I take comfort in knowing that I will be with God when I die.

The prophet, Joel, reminds us to step into the presence of God by remembering our sins and bringing them to God with repentance.

Thus we are invited to step into a time of remembrance, reformation, and renewal, to actualize what the people of God

have experienced in the past. Ash Wednesday is a time to remember (re-experience), be reformed (made over), and renewed (made new) by God. We are children of God, but we are sinful, lost like the prodigal son (in Luke 15). The prodigal son was called to return home to his father. Like him, we have gone astray and forgotten who we are.

But the message to us from the prophet Joel is not all darkness and gloom, for through his prophet, God utters that, "Yet even now." "Yet even now ... return to me ... return to the Lord." Even now, in the midst of our sinful ways, when we have been so busy with our own affairs that we have repeatedly neglected others; even when we have forgotten to rely on God and have counted on our own self-sufficiency; even when we have burdened our souls with pride and anger and guilt; even when we think we do

not have a prayer with which to stand before the Lord, God spreads wide his arms of mercy on a cross and bids us return to

him.



The council meeting was held on January 17th.

- We will look into having a Maundy Thursday dinner similar to the Christmas dinner.
- Envelopes for Sunday School children need to be distributed.
- Preschool is going to reopen in February 1st. They will have one class five days a week with twelve students. They will follow Covid guidelines.
- We are waiting a date from Monk Heating to install Air Scrubbers on our HVAC units and to replace the heating unit in the music room.
- The Finance Committee will meet with John Schwear to review our Janney Montgomery investment on January 20th.
- Our second Congregational Meeting will be held on February 14 @ 10:15am. We will distribute the information for the meeting the week before to allow people a chance to review the information.
- The roof on the Social Hall will need to be replaced this year. When we put the cross on the roof we discovered that the roof has dried out and some of the asphalt is missing from the shingles. I will be working to get price quotes to bring back to council for review. We will look to change the roof out to a metal roof. We will be asking for

help to repair the roof through donations from the congregation.

- We are going to look into doing a drive to help the homeless population in the area. More information to come once we determine what they can use.
- Pastor will look into holding a community service for those that have passed away from Covid this past year. More to come on this.
- Our next council meeting will be held on February 21st.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of the penitential season of Lent. Its true name is actually not "Ash Wednesday" but "The Day of Ashes." Whichever name is used, the reference to ashes comes from the ceremony of placing ashes on the forehead in the shape of the cross as a sign of penitence. This custom was introduced by Pope Gregory I, who was Bishop of Rome from to 590 A.D. to 604 A.D. It was enacted as a universal practice in all of Western Christendom by the Synod of Benevento in 1091 A.D.

Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17th begins the forty-day season of Lent: forty days which correspond to the time Jesus spent in the desert wilderness being tempted by Satan. It is not a season we should enter into unadvisedly or lightly, for this is the most important part of the Christian year. Here we encounter our faith in all its fullness: in all its depth and height, in all its darkness and light, in all its pain and glory.

Lent is a somber time, a time for reflection and growth, a time to change our ways and deepen our commitment. This year I will once again I plan to offer services at 11:00 a.m. every Wednesday. Those services will be held indoors. I will also offer videotaped services for those who prefer. We will also offer an evening outdoor service on Ash Wednesday at

6:00 p.m. You will hear more about Lent in the coming weeks.


